

#### Commonwealth Support for the Australian Aviation Wildlife Hazard Group (AAWHG)

Thank you for your letter dated 4 May 2010 about possible format Commonwealth recognition of AAWHO. As the issues of bird and wildlife management in aviation are of interest to both the Department and the Civil Aviation Safety Authority (CASA), I have asked our agencies to sweek together to formulate a model under which AAWHG might be formally recognised by the Commonwealth. I apologies for the delay in replying to you getter while this consultation took place.

I acknowledge the significant work of AAWIGI in promoting awareness, education and risk miligation relating to bird and wildfife hazareh to aviation. It is a credit to the individuals and their organisations that they are able to provide ongoing commitment to the work of AAWIGI.

The Department and CASA recognises the important role of AAWHG in meeting the throat of the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) Airport Services Manual Part 3 – Bird Control and Reduction (ICAO Doc 9137) and Conclusion 18/1 of ICAO'S Asia Pacific Air Navingation Planning and Implementation Regional Group, regarding the establishment of National Bird and Wildfelf-Management Committees with respect to aviation.

The Department and CASA are prepared to continue support of AAWHG through a shared socretariate support role and continuing attendance in an appropriate capacity at the Groupe. Further to this, I propose to strengthen the capacity of the Communwealth to consider the work of AAWHG through formul recognition of AAWHG by the Aviation Integritementation Group (AIG). 

















#### Wasp Ecology study - Pitot Probe blockages
